



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## Liz's Letter



As I write this letter Doug and I are delighted to have become grandparents once again. We have a new little granddaughter just a couple of days old. Her parents are staying with us in Capel while their new house is being sorted out which means we are sharing in this wonderful new born phase of their first baby's young life. It has taken me right back to nearly 40 years ago when our first child was born in Kingston Hospital - to the 8 days or so spent in those big old fashioned wards when Sister ruled and babies went to nurseries at night! These days of course new parents are home very much sooner and things have no doubt changed for the better but one thing doesn't change - that it is such an overwhelming, vulnerable time for all concerned, as not only is a child born but new parents are born as well. And then there is the baby who is completely dependant on their parent for absolutely everything.

This vulnerability we remember was the same for Jesus as a new born to his parents, teenager mother Mary and her husband Joseph. And how vulnerable they must have felt away from their home and in very temporary accommodation shared with the animals most probably. It was a vulnerability God called these two to embrace as he sent his Son to be born among us; to live among us; to be one of us, yet without sin although knowing and experiencing life as a human being. A mystery indeed yet it was a revelation foretold through scripture and continuing to be fulfilled as we worship and celebrate his coming into the world.

As this festive season approaches there are many different services and events planned in order to help you worship and celebrate throughout December. The month begins as usual with the decorating of the community organisation Christmas trees lining the path and front of our Capel Church and later the same day we regather for the grand switch on of the lights and an opportunity to sing some carols outside as usual. The lovely Crown Pub will be offering supper I know and then there is a wonderful concert to enjoy inside church as Green Matthews entertain us with some 'Midwinter Revels,' songs, tales and carols from yuletide past! A busy day indeed! Then the following afternoon at St Margaret's Ockley we have the first of our annual Christingle services where we discover through the making of the Christingle Orange that Christ is the light of the world. All children are welcome of course whatever age you happen to be! We are all God's children.

Talking of children of all ages - on the following Saturday, over in Ockley on the Green, there will be more carols and a surprise visit from a

bearded gentleman in a red costume riding on a sleigh. I wonder who that might be?! The next day if you fancy something a little bit different again why not come along on Sunday morning to our Christmas Cafe Church where we will enjoy more songs, carols, poems and laughter - again an opportunity for all the family to join in, courtesy of Bob and the Cafe Church Band. I can't wait! Later that day we have the last of the Capel teas for the season. I think there may well be some of Joy's famous Christmas puddings there too.

The Saturday before Christmas there is more carol singing to enjoy at Ockley Village Hall for the Ockley Cricket Club. If you have any more energy for carol singing the following evening we will be holding our traditional Nine Lessons and Carols at St John's Church Capel. A lovely prelude to Christmas Eve with our Crib service and Midnight Communion which begins at 11pm!! This means by 12 midnight we are singing Silent Night in candlelight and wishing one another the first "Happy Christmas!". Which leaves us with the great day itself where we join as our two churches to welcome the new born King at our Christmas Day service of worship and celebration at St Margaret's Ockley. For the first time in an age Boxing Day is on a Sunday and we drop down a gear slightly as both our churches are able to offer you a traditional Matins at Ockley or a said service of Holy Communion at Capel - both services offering a time to quietly reflect on all the busyness of the lead up to Christmas, a sacred quiet time of space as the year draws to a close.

So there it is! Sounds exhausting but don't let it be so. As we reflect on the vulnerability of the Christ child remember how vulnerable we are especially at this busiest of seasonal times, when expectations can run high and pressure builds. We are vulnerable too of course as the pandemic continues so choose your services and events carefully; remember that we are watchful over helping to keep you safe. Christmas although a time to celebrate is a difficult time for many, particularly for the bereaved and lonely. Please know that we wish to pray for you and serve you as your parish churches in the best way we can. We will have the prayer trees inside both churches for you so that you can write down your hopes and dreams and prayers for whoever or whatever you feel so called. Place them on the tree and they will be prayed for throughout the month at our regular weekly services. I pray that during this month you may find peace amidst whatever and wherever you find yourself in your life and may I wish you a very happy Christmas and New Year. I pray too that you will realise that however vulnerable Jesus himself once was, like we all were once when we were newly born into this world, and still very much are, God is our heavenly parent and will see to our every need if we trust and depend on him.

# DORKING MUSEUM IN DECEMBER

Dorking Museum offers seasonal greetings to all readers and to the supporters and friends of the Museum. If you are in the town, why not drop into our shop for some Dorking themed cards, books or gifts? Or get away from the season's rushing around and take a leisurely browse around the Museum – there is always plenty to see and to find out about the heritage of our beautiful area.

Please note that the Museum will be closed over the main Christmas/New Year period, during the weeks commencing 20th and27 th December, reopening on 6th January 2022.

The Museum's current special exhibition, 'Darking 1620', marks the 400th anniversary of the sailing

of The Mayflower and weaves the story of the six pilgrims from Dorking who undertook that perilous voyage to the New World with an examination of 17th century life in the town they left behind.

How different Christmas must have seemed to those who arrived in the New World on the Mayflower. Back in England, the Christmas season was marked by 12 days of merriment, with churchgoing, festive decorations and the giving of presents intermingled with widespread revelry, heavy feasting, excessive drinking, licentiousness and other excesses. However, the Puritans believed that the Catholic celebration was a sinful extravagance fuelled by immorality, leading some to conclude that England was no longer a country where the 'godly' could consent to live.

For the Mayflower passengers, there was little celebration of Christmas in 1620. After searching the coast for a suitable place to settle, they landed at what became Plymouth Harbor on December 22nd. Although conditions on the Mayflower were cramped and squalid and its passengers weakened and in poor health, it was too late in the year to establish dwellings on land, so most of the settlers remained on board. The advance party reportedly spent Christmas Day building their village common house, which was to house many of the Pilgrims.

Although the settlement was better established the following year, the puritan ethic remained strong. Returning from the forest with a work party, Governor William Bradford of Plymouth Colony found some of those who chose to take Christmas Day off rather than work 'gaming and revelling' in the streets, which went against their strict religious beliefs, and they were severely reprimanded.

Come along to the Museum and enjoy a fuller view of life in 'Darking' in 1620 and the story of William Mullins and the Mayflower travellers, including period apparel and a magnificent cross section model of the Mayflower, created as a real labour of love by the Dorking Men's Shed team.



Family Activity: At the Museum on Saturday, December 4th, come along to the Elves Holiday Crafting Workshop. Elves are very busy at this time of the year. You can help them out by using your creativity and crafting your very own elf to add to the holiday fun. All materials supplied. Children must be accompanied. Come along any time between 10am and 3.30pm (we close at 4pm). Free entry. The Museum's family activities are supported by The Arts Society Dorking.

Walking in Dorking: The Museum walks team has finished its programme of scheduled walks until spring, but can take private group bookings, subject to availability, for a range of walk itineraries in the town as well as The Deepdene Trail and Betchworth Castle. Suitable for family, friends, organisations, or events: please see dorkingmuseum.org.uk/guided-walks-around-dorking/.

Can you help? The Museum is run entirely by volunteers and new members are urgently needed to join the team of Visitor Assistants to meet, greet and assist visitors. There are also more specialised roles in the management and development of the Museum, currently including a Visitor Assistant Manager, Events Co-ordinator and in the Education team, working with schools and other youth groups to develop and deliver our education programme. Archives: The Museum is also restructuring the Archive team and looking to recruit an archivist / archive manager, and someone to look after customer service in the archive, making sure that material is available to researchers, online and queries are answered by the team. 
### **Festive Willow Decorations**

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

#### CHRISTMAS DISHES WITH A TWEAK!

Ah, the season of Christmas is here again and hopefully we can all celebrate this year with family and friends. That means, to some families, a lot of traditional dishes but sometimes it's nice for the cook to ring the changes - but not to upset anyone, though! For example, try finely shredding your sprouts and stir-frying them in a little oil and butter, maybe adding a little sautéed onion and chestnuts. Even sprout haters will try these.

So, here is my "tweaked" red cabbage and a different take on mince pies.

### Beetroot and balsamic red cabbage:

Serves 6 to 8 Vegetarian/Vegan Gluten-free

### <u>Ingredients:</u>

500g red cabbage 500g raw beetroot 1 small red onion finely chopped 2tbsp vegetable or sunflower oil 50g demerara sugar 3tbsp balsamic vinegar 5 allspice berries, crushed Black pepper/salt

### Method:

- 1 Quarter the cabbage, cut away the core and shred. Peel the beetroot (use rubber gloves for this!) and grate using a box grater or the coarse grater on a food processor.
- 2 Put a large pan or casserole over a medium heat, add the oil and heat for a minute. Add the onion and a pinch of salt. Soften without colouring for about 5 or 6 minutes, then add the cabbage and cook for a further 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the beetroot, sugar, vinegar, allspice and a good grinding of black pepper.
- 3 Stir, cover and reduce the heat to low. Cook slowly for one hour, stirring once or twice until the cabbage is tender.

### Cook's Notes:

This tastes even better if you make it the day before, fridge overnight and gently reheat on the big day!

### Mincemeat and cherry flapjacks:

Makes 18 squares Vegetarian

### **Ingredients:**

110g jar of mincemeat

200g of cherries - a mixture of glacé and sour, dried cherries roughly chopped

150g unsalted butter 6tbsp golden syrup 450g jumbo oats Optional 1 – 2 tbsp of Amaretto

### Method:

1 Preheat the oven 180C/160C fan/Gas mark4/350F

2 If using, stir 1tbsp of the Amaretto into the mincemeat then taste and add more if required.

3 Put the cherries, butter, syrup and mincemeat into a large pan, heat gently until the butter has melted and then stir.

4 Remove the pan from the heat, stir in the oats and mix thoroughly. Spoon the mixture into a well-buttered 18 x 28cm rectangular baking tin and press down with the back of a spoon.

5 Bake for 20/25minutes or until lightly golden. Mark into 18 squares and allow to cool completely.

6 When cold, cut into the squares and store in an airtight container.

### Cook's Notes:

Mince pies are delicious (especially homemade) but this is something a little different. Still Christmassy - but a lot easier to make. If you have the time, mix the cherries, mincemeat and Amaretto together in a bowl, cover and leave for 24 hours. The cherries will really take up the flavour of the booze!!!!!

### Fruit and veg in season now:

Brussel sprouts; leeks; cabbages; swede; parsnips; kale; chestnuts. Clementines; cranberries; oranges; grapefruit.

### SAD LOSS OF A CAPEL LANDMARK



Those who regularly walk or drive down The Street, south of Capel's Crown pub, will be familiar with the green space at a crook in the road, marked by the vintage red telephone box and the old Horse Chestnut tree. How sad, therefore to lose this old tree, much admired by our children for having survived the 1987 Great Storm when so many other trees were lost, and much loved as a source of some of the best conkers in the village. In earlier times, it was a landmark for villagers using Palmers Stores and the old Post Office, the butchers shop or frequenting the Jolly Farmers pub – all now converted into residential homes.

Whatever happened to this landmark tree? Along with many other Horse Chestnut trees, it was hit by disease. There are two pathogens responsible – firstly a small moth (Cameraria ohridella) whose larval stage leaf miner burrows into the tree's leaves causing them to dry, turn brown and drop prematurely. Following years of leaf miner infestation, the tree is then vulnerable to "bleeding canker" which is caused by a pseudomonas bacterium which results in cracks in the bark oozing a dark sticky fluid. There is no known cure for this double attack on the Horse Chestnut's welfare.

However, it is with great pleasure that we have welcomed the wood felled from this great tree into our fields as "Fraserfields Bug Hotel". Decaying wood is really important for wildlife, giving shelter, refuge from predators and a place to raise their young, and Wes and Rory have created a State of the Art sculpture from these great chunks of Horse Chestnut for that purpose. Our focus now is to optimise this wonderful resource for our different wildlife residents. We plan to add a "roof" to ensure some dry areas as cosy beds for hedgehogs, ladybirds and lacewings, to drill holes at the warmer sunny ends for the solitary bees, to add dry leaves, sticks and bark to some nooks, crannies and tunnels for beetles, centipedes, spiders and other minibeasts and to add rocks and stones to some cool damp crevices for toads and woodlice. What a happy end for a great old tree!

December is not a month that we meet with apathy. It is impossible to greet it unemotionally. With the year drawing to a close, Christmas fast approaching, a scarcity of daylight and winter beginning to embrace us, it is easy to forget the joys of our gardens. We can see the bare bones of the garden now, the structures and shapes and think about changes we want to make the following year.

- · keep weeding during mild spells
- raise plants in pots off the ground to avoid water logging. Make sure they have plenty of light
- collect leaves from beds and lawns. Place in wire bins or jute bags to rot down as leaf mould
- repair damaged areas of lawn if weather permits
- pinch out the tips of autumn sown sweet peas to encourage bushier plants for next year
- take hardwood cuttings
- prune climbing roses removing damaged or diseased growth, and tie in new shoots
- plant bare root roses, shrubs and trees
- dig over bare beds incorporating organic matter
- lift and divide overcrowded rhubarb. Replant outer sections in manure rich soil
- protect the tips of fig trees with fleece. Frost can damage next year's fruit.
- winter prune fruit trees to keep their shape and promote better quality fruit
- prune grape vines
- prune established blackcurrant plants removing old and diseased stems, and leaving new shoots that will bear most of next years fruits
- sow large onions, and transplant the young plants in spring
- net brassicas to protect from pigeons
- check greenhouse heaters are working.
- bring forced bulbs indoors to promote flowering
- cut down watering for house plants. Check they have adequate light and are not sitting in drafts

Even though I spend less time physically working in my garden through the winter it is still often in my thoughts. Flicking through garden magazines, looking at photos of previous years and spending a ridiculous amount of time trawling through seed catalogues finding my new favourite plant!

Wishing you all a very merry Christmas and a happy new year.

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# REFLECTIONS

### Reflections on the Capel Military Show, September 4 - 5th 2021

It has become customary to warn people that what they may be about to see, hear or read might upset or offend them. The following text might have that effect.

I was born in 1939, a few months before the start of the second World War. I lived with my family in Islington, North London, throughout the war and we narrowly survived the Blitz, the continuing bombing of London and the onslaught by V1 and V2 'vengeance weapons'. For many months we slept in a dank and spider-infested Anderson shelter in the back garden, fearful of being blown to bits – like seven close neighbours - and waiting for the air-raid sirens to sound the all-clear. Fortunately, the defeat of the Luftwaffe by the RAF in the Battle of Britain thwarted Hitler's plan to invade and occupy Great Britain. Had the Germans been successful I and the rest of my Jewish family might well have been taken to a concentration camp to be gassed and incinerated, sharing the fate of millions of people considered by the Germans to be 'untermenschen' - subhuman.

Clearly, we did not suffer this fate, but my war-torn childhood left me with an abiding interest in the history of the war and the Holocaust, and grave suspicion of nationalism. The nightly bombing raids, the thunder of anti-aircraft guns and the probing glare of searchlights in the night sky has left me with a morbid fascination with warfare. The regular passage of military vehicles past our house fuelled this interest as did the curious hobby, enjoyed at that time by small boys, of collecting shrapnel from the many bombsites in the neighbourhood and displaying choice pieces of mangled metal on the mantelpiece. It is perhaps not surprising, therefore, that I looked forward to satisfying this appetite for military hardware by attending the 2021 Capel Military Show.

This event is regarded by many as a worthy enterprise, with laudable intentions. To quote the organizers: 'Capel Military Show is a not-for-profit local show run by a small team of military vehicle enthusiasts and collectors. Our mission is simple; to run a friendly and inclusive event with the aim of promoting and raising much needed funds for military charities.' [Capel and Beare Green Parish Magazine, November 2021, p. 37]. This year the Show was attended by some 15,000 visitors, was clearly a success and must have raised a large sum of money for the charities it supports.

However, I was horrified to see that the Show was tainted by the presence of several displays of Nazi regalia and weapons, attended by people ('re-enactors') wearing Nazi uniforms. Two of these exhibits referred explicitly to the SS (the Schutzstaffel), a major paramilitary organization owing allegiance to Adolf Hitler and the German Nazi party. The SS participated in arguably the most horrific crimes in recorded,

history – namely the extermination, on an industrial scale, of Jews, Roma gay people, and other groups thought by the Nazis to be sub-human. The SS also took part in unspeakable medical experiments on men, women, and children and in the murder of people, including thousands of children, considered to be disabled or a genetic threat to future generations, and therefore 'unworthy of life.'

Why these re-enactors chose to spend a weekend in Surrey dressed as mass-murderers puzzled me. To gain insight, I spoke at some length to two of them, who were proud to pose for photographs in their SS uniforms. They told me that they regarded their activities as 'living history' and that their intention was to extol the virtues of the SS as an elite military cadre worthy of admiration. They were reluctant to discuss the sickening record of the SS and disagreed with my suggestion that their grotesque masquerade sanitized and glamorized the murderous organization they personified. They bridled at my notion that a more informative and balanced display of 'living history' would have included, for example, a mass grave, a crematorium, a pile of human ashes, or a large sack of human hair.

I also asked them how I could distinguish a Nazi re-enactor from a neo-Nazi. If a person dresses up as a member of the SS and professes admiration for their values and military prowess despite knowing their vile history, I would suspect that he or she would be attracted to the farright movements of today. Their responses could be summarized as stout denial. Another exhibit depicted the Volkssturm, a deeply unsavoury Nazi paramilitary organization which conscripted and armed young boys and old men in a futile attempt to bolster the defence of the German Reich in the closing stages of the war. Members of the Volkssturm committed atrocities against fellow German citizens.

In my view, this portrayal of organizations whose chief function was the systematic extermination of many millions of children, women, and men, was abhorrent. It was especially shocking in the setting of a local village event (attended by large numbers of children) whose benign objective was to entertain, to be friendly and inclusive, and to raise money for charity. The Capel Military Show website did not contain explicit warnings that the Show would include such offensive displays.

The presence of these charades at the Show could be interpreted as support for neo-Nazi groups. A stand selling Nazi militaria, and prominently displaying swastika flags, could only add to this impression. We are living in an era of heightened nationalism, xenophobia, and the resurgence of extremism. Do we wish Capel to be regarded as a community that could be seen, albeit mistakenly, to provide a platform for such odious organizations and to endorse their values?

### **Living History Letter Response**



Thank you for allowing us the opportunity to consider and respond to Dr Venitt's letter to the Parish Council on his experience at the Capel Military Show. We appreciate anyone who takes the time to provide feedback and we take any complaint or concern very seriously.

The Capel Military Show has a hard earned reputation as a friendly, family show. It is run entirely by volunteers with the simple mission to raise money and awareness of Military charities and help fund local projects whilst providing a safe, informative, fun and action packed show.

It won't surprise anyone to learn that the Show was the most successful it has ever been this year. Our visitor numbers more than doubled over the weekend and, in turn, raised more than £21,900 for charity - £7,900 of which has already been donated to Capel Village.

We recognise that the Shows increased popularity caused the village, and our own team, unacceptable issues and challenges over the weekend for which we can only deeply apologise. Some issues we were able to correct and get right immediately, other's we will address and rectify for 2022.

The most serious issue raised, and the one we want to address in more detail, is concerns regarding the German reenactors and a trader selling offensive, replica, Nazi memorabilia. We would like to think that had we not been so distracted by the intensity of this year's event, we would have seen and dealt with the trader at the time. Whilst nothing illegal was taking place, the items on sale and display are not something that we support and we would have had the items removed and the Show's position on the the sale of these types of items made clear. This is, fortunately, a relatively easy fix.

The issues raised about the German reenactors is more complex and something we are not shying away from but addressing head on, not just with the Germans, but with all nationalities because we recognise how important it is that we get this right for all conflicts. We don't have all the answers yet but we are working on it and would like to invite Dr Venitt, and the village, to be involved and help us get it right.

We strongly believe that it is important to learn from past conflicts and not sanitise history by excluding the unsavoury elements, but to portray them as accurately as possible. We recognise that it is essential that this is done the right way and sensitively, with all views taken into consideration on such difficult and emotive subjects. We are disappointed that we fell short of that this year.

The Capel Military Show does not support, condone or encourage politics, violence, extremism, racism, historical revisionism or the glorification of war in any form. Our experience of living history groups attending the Show is that they do not do so to shock or offend anyone and that their interest lies in the history of the forces they have chosen, not in any political steering. They aim to be historically accurate in what they do and do not wear or display any insignia or regalia that isn't factually accurate for their portrayal.

Each living history group is acutely aware of the controversial portrayal of their hobby and people with paramilitary, ideological or extreme views are not accepted as members or welcome at the show. The engagement Dr Venitt described with the German reenactors has highlighted to us that all living history groups should be able to explain why they choose to represent a particular unit when asked. It is also essential that the Show balances the displays with both sides of history, this is something we are actively working on to address and another area we would welcome input.

As we continue to discuss the best approach to managing the living history groups, there are some immediate changes that we will be implementing. It will be made clear at the entrance to the show, the entrance to the Living History areas, on the website, social media and marketing material the nature of the history being depicted, what visitors can expect to see and allow them to decide if they wish to join us and visit the show and displays.

We will also be amending the terms of condition for entry and participation for all exhibitors, traders and living history and reenactment groups, clearly defining what is acceptable at the Capel Military Show and, more importantly, what is not acceptable. Any infringements on these terms and conditions will result in action being taken by the show organisers.

In the meantime, we want to apologise unreservedly for any offence or concerns caused and reassure everyone that we are working to get it right in 2022.

## My Life as a Chimney Sweep David Parker



### Part 7

With the knowledge that I have a DBS clearance as a youth worker a woman once asked me if I would look after her eleven year old son and nine year old daughter while she went off to collect her other child from college. Would I mind feeding the dog was another one, the woman had left me a key to let myself in to sweep the chimney. Another one was, would I let the dog out into the garden and get it back in when I had finished.

Parked up in a gateway having lunch one day a car pulled up, two men got out, one of them had a professional looking video camera. A few minutes later a woman came tearing up the road in a car I did not recognise, she turned round at the top of the road and came back down. I got rather curious about what was going on so after about the fifth run I enquired as to what this was about, only to be told that this was a new model of the Ford Mondeo and they were filming the press footage for its release. Not only was this the new model, but it was also the only one in this country at the time. I had the chance to have a close look at it and sit in it with my sooty overalls. A couple of years later at the same gateway I heard a horse coming down the road, nothing unusual about this normally but on this occasion, it was tacked up but without a rider. I managed to pull the van over the road to block its way and with the help of a woman coming up the road we managed to catch it. This woman knew the stables so took the horse back and I went off to find a rather dejected but unharmed rider.

I have on occasions damaged a television aerial or two. Mostly this is caused by the aerial being installed badly with it crossing directly over the chimney pot. The added problem with a bad installation like this is that the soot and smoke tend to corrode the aerial. In a house at Alfold the aerial rigger had done a cowboy job, instead of running the cable through the loft he had taken an easy option of dropping down the chimney. I got my brush well and

truly tangled so when trying to bring the brush down I ruined the cable and aerial.

As mentioned in the previous episode I may be the only person people see for a while so I am very often told things that maybe I shouldn't be told or the customer just wants someone to talk to. One such lady would book me in every year to sweep the chimney even if she had not used the fire, she lived at the end of track in the countryside so did not get many visitors. The postman would always stop to have a cup of tea and a chat with her, it was the last call on his round

With my history interest I am lucky in the fact that I have been given some very nice things for my collection of militaria, things that might otherwise get thrown in the bin. Not military but I kicked into a door stop one time, a few choice words followed. Some time passed and the lady said to me that I better take the door stop home as I was the only person that had taken an interest in it. Funny how hurting your toe is regarded as taking an interest. It so happened that this heavy piece of stone does have a plaque on it to say it came from the houses of parliament, this was courtesy of the Luftwaffe during the Second World War when the building was hit by a bomb.

At a house in Pulborough, Wendy asked me if I had a few minutes to spare. It was in the hot summer months of 2018. The tortoise was wandering round the garden. As Wendy is really struggling with severe arthritis she wondered if I would bath the tortoise. On my visit in 2020 Wendy asked if I would feed the tortoise for her.
